PASTOR'S MESSAGE

The next day he saw Jesus coming toward him, and said, "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world!" (John 1:29 ESV).

⁸Though you have not seen him, you love him. Though you do not now see him, you believe in him and rejoice with joy that is inexpressible and filled with glory, ⁹ obtaining the outcome of your faith, the salvation of your souls (1 Peter 1:8-9 ESV).

Dear Friends in Christ:

Paul's words in 1 Peter 1:8-9 bring to conclusion the opening of his first epistle. Peter states clearly that through the love we have for Jesus (that is, through faith in Him), we obtain the salvation of our souls. These are great words of joy for us Christians who indeed trust in Jesus for our salvation.

Yet, these words cap off a section where Peter talks about the trials and tribulations which are faced by all of God's people. Throughout such trials, Peter focuses our attention to Jesus through whom you have "an inheritance that is imperishable, undefiled, and unfading, kept in heaven for you" (1 Peter 1:4). Though we may lose everything in this world on account of our faith in Jesus, we have not lost *everything*, for we have Jesus, our Lord and Savior.

As we near the middle of the third decade of this millennium, such trials seem to be getting closer to us as God's people. We live in a post-Christian culture in 2024 in which the role of the Christian worldview has been reduced. (By "post-Christian," I mean that the Christian worldview is often no longer the primary worldview in the lives of most people. That is to say, Christian values and morals do not have as much weight in political and social discourse and are often secondary to ideals and mores that are secular in nature.) As we move further into this post-Christian culture – as the influence of the church continues to wane – we grasp hold and firmly cling to Jesus. Only in Jesus can we find true hope.

Yet, this post-Christian culture provides great opportunity for us as well. We no longer can assume that people know the Bible (or even who Jesus is). We have wonderful opportunities to share God's Word with those we meet in the various places God has placed us – in our homes, in our workplaces, in our communities. We share that message both in word and deed. As we love people through our deeds, may God grant us the opportunity to share also the words of His great love for all people in Jesus Christ.

May is Lupus Awareness Month

The Lupus Foundation of America estimates that 1.5 million Americans, and at least five million people worldwide, have a form of lupus. Ninety percent (90%) of people living with lupus are women. Most people with lupus develop the disease between the ages of 15-44. However, men, children, and teenagers develop lupus, too. People with lupus can experience significant symptoms, such as pain, extreme fatigue, hair loss, cognitive issues, and physical impairments that affect every facet of their lives. Many suffer from cardiovascular disease, strokes, disfiguring rashes, and painful joints. For others, there may be no visible symptoms.

There are four different forms of lupus.

- Systemic Lupus accounts for approximately 70 percent of all cases of lupus. In approximately half of these cases, a major organ or tissue in the body, such as the heart, lungs, kidneys, or brain will be affected.
- Cutaneous Lupus (affecting only the skin) accounts for approximately 10% of all lupus cases.
- Drug-induced Lupus accounts for about 10 % of all lupus cases and is caused by high doses of certain medications. The symptoms of drug induced lupus are similar to systemic lupus; however, symptoms usually subside when the medications are discontinued.
- Neonatal Lupus is a rare condition in which the mother's antibodies affect the fetus. At birth, the baby may have a skin rash, liver problems, or low blood cell counts, but these symptoms typically disappear completely after six months with no lasting effects.

Lupus is two to three times more prevalent among African American, Hispanic/Latina, Asian American, Native American, Alaska Native, Native Hawaiian and other Pacific Islander women than among White women. Recent research indicates that lupus affects 1 in 537 young African American women. The groundbreaking LUMINA (Lupus in Minority Populations: Nature vs. Nurture) study reported that African American lupus patients are more likely to have organ system involvement, more active disease, and lower levels of social support compared with White lupus patients.

Lupus symptoms

Because lupus can affect so many different parts of the body, it can cause a lot of different symptoms. And many people with lupus don't have all the symptoms. The most common lupus symptoms (which are the same for men and women) are:

- Extreme fatigue
- Pain or swelling in joints
- Swelling in the hands, feet, or around the eyes
- Headaches
- Low fevers
- Sensitivity to light
- Chest pain with deep breathing



WinGs 2023 Annual Report submitted by Elaine King

Charity checks were mailed from 2023 & rummage/bake sale proceeds in early 2024, as follows:

- \$150.00 to Concordia High School, \$100 to Concordia Seminary, \$400 for LSUS Teacher's Coffee/ Treat purchased through Sharing Peace Cafe Ministry, \$300 to Peace Preschool, \$300 to LSUS, \$150 to Bethlehem Lutheran Food Bank (in partnership with Associated Churches), \$50 to Lutheran Reporter, and \$50 to Lutheran Media Ministries. A total of \$1,365!
- Four project requests for specific area needs were awarded, which include:
 - ♦ \$1,000 for Preschool Playground Repair (Primarily the Ark), \$400 for Peace Food Pantry, \$200 for new high chairs in Fellowship Hall, and \$275 for new banners for the Sharing Peace Cafe Ministry. A total of \$1,875!
- Additional actions during 2023: Installation of handrail in the Sanctuary near altar, fruit baskets provided for Shut -Ins, 4 Narthex pillows, altar flowers, Rummage and Bake Sale, baby shower, 2 funeral Lunches, and LWML Fall

Many people with lupus also have problems that affect their skin and hair, such as a butterfly-shaped rash on the cheeks and nose, hair loss, sores in the mouth or nose, and fingers or toes turning white or blue and feeling numb when a person is cold or stressed (Raynaud's disease). If you have these symptoms, it doesn't necessarily mean you have lupus, because lupus shares a lot of symptoms of other diseases, such as diabetes and arthritis. So if you have these common lupus symptoms, it's important to talk to your healthcare provider and find out whether you have lupus or a different health problem so you can get the treatment needed for you.



"My congregation won't know what to do with a gift if I leave something from my estate." That is where the conversation turned between two friends having coffee one afternoon. The other responded, "I thought our Church had an endowment fund. Have you considered giving to that?" "I hate to admit it, but I really don't know what it is about. I've heard financial reports at congregational meetings, but it just seemed like numbers. It's my fault, but I have never investigated what that fund does."

This experience is quite common for many of us. Our world is so full of information that we have to decide about what we will consider and when we will consider it. It may be true that we haven't spent much time thinking about charitable gifting from our estates and so we have not paid much attention to something like our congregation's endowment fund, or future ministry fund.

So where do we start? Your LCMS Foundation Gift Planning Counselor is trained to assist you in creating a gift plan that blesses the family you love and the ministries you care about. Part of that work for gifting to ministry might be some research, identifying the proper recipient of a gift from your estate. Maybe your questions are similar to what others have already asked. Or maybe the Gift Planning Counselor knows exactly who to ask.
